BMZ Strategy and Guidelines on human rights in German development policy

The cross-sectoral strategy affirms the central role of human rights in German development policy and contains binding requirements for the implementing agencies; the Guidelines provide guidance on the incorporation of human rights standards and principles, including gender, in programme proposals.

United Nations reference documents related to equality before courts and tribunals and the right to a fair trial

International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR), Articles 14 and 26, the rights to equality before the law and to a fair trial, Articles 9 and 10, the right to liberty and security, also of persons under arrest or in detention, Article 7, the prohibition of torture; and further justice-related rights enshrined in Articles 11, 15 and 16.

UN Human Rights Committee (HR Committee), General Comment No. 32 on ICCPR Art.14: the right to equality before courts and tribunals and to a fair trial (CCPR/C/GC/32, 2007)

The treaty bodies, committees of independent experts established under the UN human rights treaties, issue "General Comments", authoritative interpretations of the provisions of the treaty. The HR Committee, through General Comment No. 32, has interpreted Article 14 with respect to the rights to equality before the law and to a fair trial.

All states parties are obliged to submit regular reports to the HR Committee on the steps taken to implement the rights stipulated by the Covenant. The Committee examines each report and addresses its concerns and recommendations to the state party in the form of "Concluding Observations".

Swiss Development Cooperation (2008), Rule of law, justice sector reform and development cooperation

This concept paper provides a concise introduction into the concept of rule of law as well as recent developments, experiences and lessons learnt in the implementation of justice sector reforms. Although not explicitly written from a human rights perspective, the concept integrates many human rights concerns and includes separate chapters on human rights and human rights-based approaches. It situates the rule of law within the broader context of recent trends such as new aid modalities, the adoption of a systemic perspective in justice sector reform programmes, access to justice for the disadvantaged, and the inclusion of non-formal justice systems. The concept concludes with a selection of lessons learnt within Swiss development cooperation.

UNDP (2011), Enforcing rights and correcting wrongs: overcoming gender barriers in legal systems

This report uncovers barriers to equality in legal systems that restrict human rights along gender lines and proposes possible ways to redress legal discrimination for accelerating human development. It explores three strategic avenues for simultaneous action: first, fixing institutions – laws, legal practices and modes of access; second, changing attitudes of those who create, uphold, and use laws; and third, establishing ongoing assessments to reveal inequalities and monitor progress.
